





Guess What's Not for Lunch...

Materials: Blackline Master Below and a brown paper lunch bag

Copy a page for each student in your class. Ask children to work with a partner to brain storm foods that would not be good to bring on a camping trip and describe why. Tell children to cut the paper sack about 1/2 way from the bottom. Then each child draws or finds a picture of the food they will be trying to get others to guess. They place the food item in the bag and write 3 clues about the food. Compile all the pages and create a book for the classroom library.
